Investment Objective, Policy and Strategy

Objective of the Fund

This Fund aims to achieve long term* capital appreciation through investments in securities of companies listed or traded in emerging and developed markets.

* Note: “long term” in this context refers to a period of between 5-7 years.

Strategy

Invests in equity and equity related securities of companies listed or traded in the Asia Pacific markets.

The asset allocation of the Fund will be as follows:-

Up to 98% of Net Asset Value	- Investments in securities of and securities relating to companies that have high growth potential.
2% - 10% of Net Asset Value	- Investments in liquid assets including bonds, money market instruments and deposits with financial institutions.

Subject to the range stipulated above, the above asset allocation will be reviewed from time to time depending on the judgement of the Manager as to the general market and economic conditions.

Performance Benchmark

Morgan Stanley Capital International (“MSCI”) AC Asia Pacific Index (RM).

Permitted Investments

This Fund may invest in securities traded on the Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad or any other market considered as an eligible market, unlisted securities, collective investment schemes, securities/instruments in foreign markets, financial derivatives, structured products, liquid assets (including money market instruments and deposits with any financial institutions), participate in the lending of securities, and any other investments permitted by the Securities Commission Malaysia from time to time.

Distribution Policy

Consistent with the Fund’s objective to achieve capital growth, distributions will therefore be of secondary importance. Distributions, if any, after deduction of taxation and expenses are generally declared annually and will be reinvested.

MANAGER'S REPORT

MARKET REVIEW

Asian equities, as measured by the MSCI Asia Pacific Index, registered a negative return of 3.40% in United States Dollar (“USD”) terms for the period between 1 January 2021 and 31 December 2021. At the beginning of the year 2021, Asian equities rallied on optimism that the COVID-19 pandemic will be over by mid-year with the rollout of vaccine. Chinese equities was one of the worst performing markets in the region, owing to early normalization of monetary policy, targeted measures to rein in property related leverage, as well as new regulations on selected sectors to address fair competition and public interest concerns. Emergence of the delta variant in India and its subsequent spread globally worsened the growth recovery outlook. Towards the end of the year, investors jostled with forecasts of earlier than anticipated Federal Reserve (“Fed”) tightening, coupled with concerns of ramping inflation and slowing growth on reopening worries on the new Omicron COVID-19 variant.

China (-22.79%) was the worst performing country over the period. The Chinese market return was affected by tightening liquidity and increased government regulations on the country’s sprawling internet sector. Malaysia (-10.47%) and Korea (-10.04%) recorded double digit declines, while India (+25.10%) and Taiwan (+23.51%) offset losses elsewhere in the region.

In sector terms, Consumer Discretionary (-16.39%), Communication Services (-15.67%) and Health care (-15.41%) led declines as the Chinese government increased regulations to prohibit monopolistic acts and protect market competition. Real Estate (-5.18%) declined largely due to liquidity concerns on Chinese property developers. Technology (-9.53%) outperformed on high Foundries utilization and component capacity tightness. Energy, on the other hand, outperformed, recording gains of 9.30%. Oil prices, as measured by Brent, rose to a high of USD86.40/ barrels (“bbl”) in end October 2021 on economic reopening before ending the period at USD77.78/bbl (+50.15%) as concerns of new COVID-19 variant Omicron spread.

ECONOMIC REVIEW AND OUTLOOK

Although vaccine approvals have raised hopes of a turnaround in the pandemic over the latter half of year 2021, renewed waves of infections and new variants of the virus still poses concerns for the overall global outlook. This is indeed evident by the changes in the growth projections projected by the International Monetary Fund (“IMF”), where they revised their year 2021 global growth estimates in their January 2021 and April 2021 updates, while maintaining year 2021 global growth at 6.00% in its July 2021 outlook. In the month of October 2021, the IMF cut its global growth estimates slightly to 5.90%, down from 6.00% earlier in the year 2021, while maintaining the forecast for year 2022 at 4.90%. The IMF predicted China to grow at a rate of 8.00% in year 2021 and 5.60% for year 2022, both figures marking a decline of 0.10 points.

The economic narrative has shifted from the initial crisis to recovery, with many countries moving toward a more ‘endemic’ view when handling the pandemic situation. With this, the list of hawkish major central banks continues to grow. So far, Norges Bank, Bank of Korea, Reserve Bank of New Zealand and the Monetary Authority of Singapore (increasing the slope of the Singapore Dollar nominal Effective Exchange Rate (“S\$NEER”) path) have already started tightening measures. The Fed has accelerated its tapering pace and quantitative easing (“QE”) will end by mid-March 2022 instead of mid-June 2022. The median forecast for the Fed fund rates now calls for three rate hikes in 2022, with market pricing now pricing in 3-4 hikes with the lift off as early as March 2022.

Year 2021 has been a busy year for policy and regulatory changes in China, and the sweeping measures have affected various sectors. During the Communist Party’s Politburo meeting and Central Economic Work Conference in December 2021, the meeting highlighted “growth stability” as the top priority for the economy in year 2022, pointing to the increasing willingness to support growth in year 2022. Indeed, policy easing has started somewhat since end-September. Beijing has gradually intensified its easing measures as it pivots to a pro-growth stance, with cuts in the reserve requirement ratio and policy rate in December 2021. While growth slowdown might continue into first quarter of year 2022 (“1Q22”) amid factory closures and tight social distancing, given the rising COVID-19 cases and zero-COVID-19 policy before the Winter Olympics, policy is expected to stay supportive.

REVIEW OF FUND PERFORMANCE AND STRATEGY DURING THE FINANCIAL YEAR

For the year under review, the RHB Asia Pacific Fund registered a negative return of 6.52%* against its benchmark positive return of 0.04%*. The Fund underperformed its benchmark by 6.56%* during the year under review. The Fund did not meet its investment objective over the reporting year.

The underweight position to India negated from performance, as we were concerned with the resurgence of COVID-19 outbreak and high valuations in the country. The market, however, held up. The overweight position to China and Korea, and the underweight position to Malaysia added to portfolio returns. Overweight and good stock selection in Taiwan and Technology stocks contribute positively to portfolio returns.

The Fund entered the period overweight to China as it has successfully controlled the pandemic outbreak and economic activity improved while other parts of Asia languished. In the second quarter of year 2021 (“2Q21”), with the increased regulatory scrutiny by the government, we reduced exposure China as regulatory scrutiny on the internet sector intensified and also with the nationalization of the education sector which was unexpected. The implications for the education sector worry the market greatly.

Over the one year period, we added to companies that were trading at attractive valuations where most were impacted by the COVID-19 situation. We added to Association of Southeast Asian Nations (“ASEAN”) as positive vaccines news and roll-out help economic recovery in the region. However, some of the hospitality exposure continue to drag performance as tourism travel remains restricted.

MARKET OUTLOOK AND STRATEGY GOING FORWARD

Overall, we remain positive on RHB Asia Pacific Fund on prospects of growth pick-up in Asia, especially in areas where governments have shifted from pandemic to endemic measures, and as vaccine roll-out continues.

We anticipate that China will soon ease policy to support growth. Furthermore, we believe the worst is over for the China internet space and would lead to renewed investors interest.

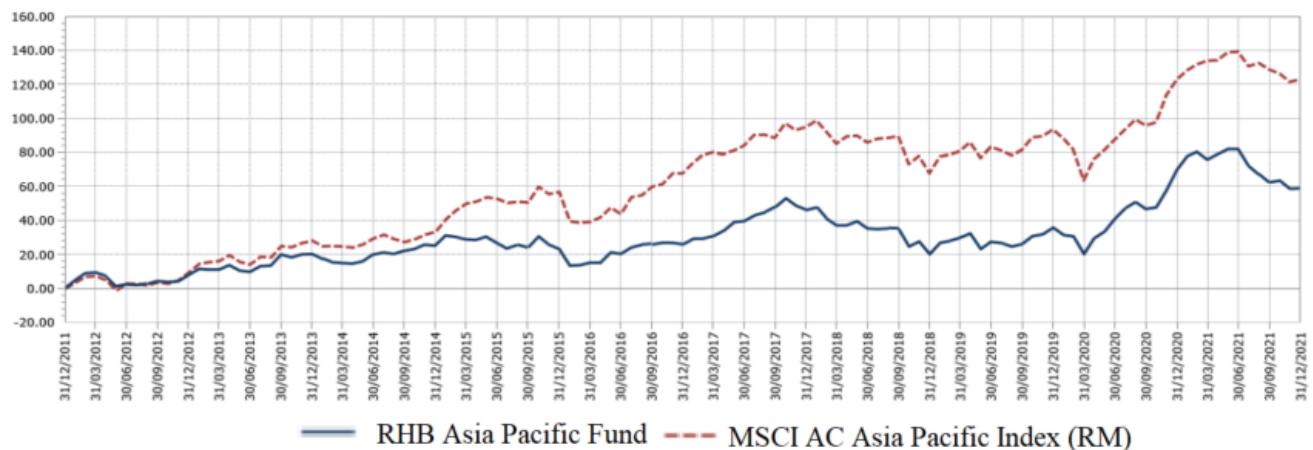
We like structural themes such as new energy, industrials and hardware technology sectors, especially within China and North Asia. There is an emphasis on carbon reduction which would in turn support the accelerated development of NEVs and renewable energy. Also there are supportive policies for technological innovation with an emphasis to strengthen technological innovation and industrial supply chain resilience. We believe these will be structural growth themes in the region.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021**

1. THE FUND, THE MANAGER AND THEIR PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The RHB Asia Pacific Fund (hereinafter referred to as “the Fund”) was constituted pursuant to the execution of a Master deed dated 27 April 2004 as modified via its first supplemental master deed dated 8 June 2004, second supplemental master deed dated 19 October 2005, third supplemental master deed dated 8 December 2005, fourth supplemental master deed dated 28 February 2006, fifth supplemental master deed dated 9 March 2006, sixth supplemental master deed dated 22 September 2006, seventh supplemental master deed dated 15 December 2006, eighth supplemental master deed dated 30 January 2007, ninth supplemental master deed dated 9 April 2007, tenth supplemental master deed dated 14 May 2007, eleventh supplemental master deed dated 15 May 2007, twelfth supplemental master deed dated 27 June 2007, thirteenth supplemental master deed dated 24 December 2007, fourteenth supplemental master deed dated 28 February 2013, fifteenth supplemental master deed dated 4 September 2013, sixteenth supplemental master deed dated 2 March 2015, seventeenth supplemental master deed dated 8 May 2015, eighteenth supplemental master deed dated 25 May 2015 and nineteenth supplemental master deed dated 3 June 2015 (collectively referred to as “the Deeds”) between RHB Asset Management Sdn Bhd (“the Manager”) and HSBC (Malaysia) Trustee Berhad (“the Trustee).

The Fund was launched on 6 January 2006 and will continue its operations until terminated as provided in the Deeds. The principal activity of the Fund is to invest in Permitted Investments as defined in the Deeds.

All investments will be subject to the Securities Commission Malaysia (“SC”)’s Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds, SC’s requirements, the Deeds, except where exemptions or variations have been approved by the SC, internal policies and procedures and objective of the Fund.

The main objective of the Fund is to achieve long term capital appreciation through investments in securities of companies listed or traded in emerging and developed markets.

The Manager, a company incorporated in Malaysia, is a wholly-owned subsidiary of RHB Investment Bank Berhad, effective 6 January 2003. Its principal activities include rendering of investment management services, management of unit trust funds and private retirement schemes and provision of investment advisory services.

These financial statements were authorised for issue by the Manager on 25 February 2022.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Basis of preparation of the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of financial assets and financial liabilities (including derivative instruments) at fair value through profit or loss, except those as disclosed in the summary of significant accounting policies, and in accordance with Malaysian Financial Reporting Standards (“MFRS”) and International Financial Reporting Standards (“IFRS”).

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with MFRS and IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of income and expenses during the financial year. It also requires the Manager to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Fund’s accounting policies. Although these estimates and judgement are based on the Manager’s best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may differ. There were no areas involving higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements.

(a) Standards and amendments to existing standards effective 1 January 2021

There are no standards, amendments to standards or interpretations that are effective for annual periods beginning on 1 January 2021 that have a material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

(b) New standards, amendments and interpretations effective after 1 January 2022 and have not been early adopted

A number of new standards, amendments to standards and interpretations are effective for annual periods beginning after 1 January 2022, and have not been early adopted in preparing these financial statements. None of these are expected to have a material effect on the financial statements of the Fund.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.2 Financial assets

Classification

The Fund classifies its financial assets in the following measurement categories:

- those to be measured subsequently at fair value through profit or loss (“FVTPL”), and
- those to be measured at amortised cost.

The Fund classifies its investments based on both the Fund’s business model for managing those financial assets and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets. The portfolio of financial assets is managed and performance is evaluated on a fair value basis. The Fund is primarily focused on fair value information and uses that information to assess the assets’ performance and to make decisions. The Fund has not taken the option to irrevocably designate any equity securities as fair value through other comprehensive income. The contractual cash flows of the Fund’s debt securities are solely principal and interest, however, these securities are neither held for the purpose of collecting contractual cash flows nor held both for collecting contractual cash flows and for sale. The collection of contractual cash flows is only incidental to achieving the Fund’s business model’s objective. Consequently, all investments are measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Fund classifies cash and cash equivalents, amount due from brokers, amount due from Manager, dividend receivables and other receivables as financial assets measured at amortised cost as these financial assets are held to collect contractual cash flows consisting of the amount outstanding.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.2 Financial assets (continued)

Recognition and measurement

Regular purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on the trade date - the date on which the Fund commits to purchase or sell the asset. Financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are initially recognised at fair value. Transaction costs are expensed as incurred in the statement of income and expenses.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the investments have expired or the Fund has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Subsequent to initial recognition, all financial assets at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value. Gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of the 'financial assets at fair value through profit or loss' category are presented in statement of income and expenses within net gain or losses on investments in the period in which they arise.

Dividend from financial assets at fair value through profit or loss is recognised in the statement of income and expenses within dividend income when the Fund's right to receive payments is established.

Quoted investments and collective investment schemes are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently re-measured at fair value based on the market price quoted on the relevant stock exchanges at the close of the business on the valuation day, where the close price falls within the bid-ask spread. In circumstances where the close price is not within the bid-ask spread, the Manager will determine the point within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of the fair value.

If a valuation based on the market price does not represent the fair value of the securities, for example during abnormal market conditions or when no market price is available, including in the event of a suspension in the quotation of the securities for a period exceeding 14 days, or such shorter period as agreed by the Trustee, then the securities are valued as determined in good faith by the Manager, based on the methods or bases approved by the Trustee after appropriate technical consultation.

Financial assets at amortised cost are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.2 Financial assets (continued)

Impairment of financial assets

The Fund measures credit risk and expected credit losses using probability of default, exposure at default and loss given default. Management considers both historical analysis and forward-looking information in determining any expected credit loss. Management considers the probability of default to be close to zero as these instruments have a low risk of default and the counterparties have a strong capacity to meet their contractual obligations in the near term. As a result, no loss allowance has been recognised based on the 12-month expected credit losses as any such impairment would be wholly insignificant to the Fund.

Significant increase in credit risk

A significant increase in credit risk is defined by management as any contractual payment which is more than 30 days past due or a counterparty credit rating which has fallen below BBB/Baa.

Definition of default and credit-impaired financial assets

Any contractual payment which is more than 90 days past due is considered credit impaired.

Write-off

The Fund writes off financial assets, in whole or in part, when it has exhausted all practical recovery efforts and has concluded there is no reasonable expectation of recovery. The assessment of no reasonable expectation of recovery is based on the unavailability of debtor's sources of income or assets to generate sufficient future cash flows to repay the amount. The Fund may write off financial assets that are still subject to enforcement activity. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off will result in impairment gains. There are no write-offs/recoveries during the financial year.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.3 Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into and the definitions of a financial liability.

Financial liabilities, within the scope of MFRS 9, are recognised in the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Fund becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

The Fund's financial liabilities which include amount due to brokers, amount due to Manager, accrued management fee, amount due to Trustee and other payables and accruals are recognised initially at fair value plus directly attributable transaction cost and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is extinguished. Gains and losses are recognised in statement of income and expenses when the liabilities are derecognised, and through the amortisation process.

2.4 Unit holders' capital

The unit holders' contributions to the Fund meet the criteria of the definition of puttable instruments to be classified as equity instruments under MFRS 132 "Financial Instruments: Presentation". These criteria include:

- the units entitle the holder to a proportionate share of the Fund's net asset value;
- the units are the most subordinated class and class features are identical;
- there is no contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial asset other than the obligation on the Fund to repurchase; and
- the total expected cash flows from the units over its life are based substantially on the statement of income and expenses of the Fund.

The outstanding units are carried at the redemption amount that is payable at each financial year if the unit holders exercise the right to put the units back to the Fund.

Units are created and cancelled at prices based on the Fund's net asset value per unit at the time of creation or cancellation. The Fund's net asset value per unit is calculated by dividing the net assets attributable to unit holders with the total number of outstanding units.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.5 Income recognition

Dividend income from quoted investments and collective investment schemes are recognised when the Fund's right to receive payment is established. Dividend income is received from financial assets measured at FVTPL.

Interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset except for financial assets that subsequently become credit-impaired. For credit-impaired financial assets, the effective interest rate is applied to the net carrying amount of the financial assets (after deduction of the loss allowance).

Realised gain or loss on sale of quoted investments and collective investment schemes are arrived at after accounting for cost of investments, determined on the weighted average cost method.

Net income or loss is the total of income less expenses.

2.6 Taxation

Current tax expense is determined according to Malaysian tax laws and includes all taxes based upon the taxable income earned during the financial year.

2.7 Cash and cash equivalents

For the purpose of the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise bank balances which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.8 Amount due from/to brokers

Amounts due from/to brokers represent receivables for securities sold and payables for securities purchased that have been contracted for but not yet settled or delivered on the date of the statement of financial position respectively. The amount due from brokers balance is held for collection.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2.8 Amount due from/to brokers (continued)

These amounts are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost. At each reporting date, the Fund shall measure the loss allowance on amounts due from brokers at an amount equal to the lifetime expected credit losses if the credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition. If, at the reporting date, the credit risk has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the Fund shall measure the loss allowance at an amount equal to 12-month expected credit losses. Significant financial difficulties of the broker, probability that the broker will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganisation, and default in payments are all considered indicators that a loss allowance may be required.

2.9 Presentation and functional currency

Items included in the financial statements of the Fund are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Fund operates (the “functional currency”). The financial statements are presented in Ringgit Malaysia (“RM”), which is the Fund’s presentation and functional currency.

Due to mixed factors in determining the functional currency of the Fund, the Manager has used its judgement to determine the functional currency that most faithfully represents the economic effects of the underlying transactions, events and conditions and have determined the functional currency to be in RM primarily due to the following factors:

- Part of the Fund’s cash is denominated in RM for the purpose of making settlement of the creation and cancellation.
- The Fund’s units are denominated in RM.
- The Fund’s significant expenses are denominated in RM.
- The Fund’s investments are significantly denominated in RM.

2.10 Foreign currency translation

Foreign currency transactions in the Fund are accounted for at exchange rates prevailing at the transaction dates. Foreign currency monetary assets and liabilities are translated at exchange rates prevailing at the reporting date. Exchange differences arising from the settlement of foreign currency transactions and from the translation of foreign currency monetary assets and liabilities are recognised in statement of income and expenses.

3. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES

The Fund is exposed to a variety of risks, which include market risk, price risk, currency risk, interest rate risk, liquidity risk, credit risk and capital risk.

Financial risk management is carried out through internal control processes adopted by the Manager and adherence to the investment restrictions as stipulated in the SC Malaysia Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds.

Market risk

Securities may decline in value due to factors affecting securities markets generally or particular industries represented in the securities markets. The value of a security may decline due to general market conditions which are not specifically related to a particular company, such as real or perceived adverse economic conditions, changes in the general outlook for corporate earnings, changes in profit or currency rates or adverse investors' sentiment generally. They may also decline due to factors that affect a particular industry or industries, such as labour shortages or increased production costs and competitive conditions within an industry. Equity securities generally have greater price volatility than fixed income securities. The market price of securities owned by a unit trust fund might go down or up, sometimes rapidly or unpredictably.

Price risk

Price risk is the risk that the fair value of an investment of the Fund will fluctuate because of changes in market prices.

The Fund is exposed to equity securities and collective investment schemes (other than those arising from interest rate risk) price risk for its investments of RM3,724,016 (2020: RM5,423,759) in equity securities and collective investment scheme.

The sensitivity analysis is based on the assumption that the price of the quoted securities investment and collective investment schemes fluctuate by +/(-) 5% with all other variables held constant, the impact on the statement of income and expenses and net asset value is +/(-)RM186,201 (2020: RM271,188).

3. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Currency risk

Currency risk is associated with financial instruments that are quoted and/or priced in foreign currency denomination. Malaysian based investor should be aware that if the Ringgit Malaysia appreciates against the currencies in which the portfolio of the investment is denominated, this will have an adverse effect on the net asset value of the Fund and vice versa. The Fund did not have any significant financial liabilities denominated in foreign currencies as at the financial year end date.

The Manager or its fund management delegate could utilise two pronged approaches in order to mitigate the currency risk; firstly by spreading the investments across different currencies (i.e. diversification) and secondly, by hedging the currencies when it deemed necessary.

The analysis is based on the assumption that the foreign exchange rate fluctuates by +/(-) 5%, with all other variables remain constants, the impact on statement of income and expenses and net asset value is +/(-) RM196,346 (2020: RM273,678).

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the cost or the value of the financial instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Fund's exposure to the interest rate risk is mainly from short term placements with licensed financial institutions. The Manager overcomes the exposure by way of maintaining deposits on short term basis. Therefore, exposure to interest rate fluctuation is minimal.

3. FINANCIAL RISK MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES AND POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting its financial obligations.

Liquidity risk exists when particular investments are difficult to sell. As such, the Fund may not be able to sell such illiquid investments at an advantageous time or price to meet its liquidity requirements. Unit trust funds with principal investment strategies that involve securities or securities with substantial market and/or credit risk tend to have the greater exposure to liquidity risk. As part of its risk management, the Manager will attempt to manage the liquidity of the Fund through asset allocation and diversification strategies within the portfolio. The Manager will also conduct constant fundamental research and analysis to forecast future liquidity of its investments.

The table below summarises the Fund's financial liabilities into relevant maturity groupings based on the remaining period from the statement of financial position date to the contractual maturity date. The amounts in the table are the contractual undiscounted cash flows.

Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the possibility that the issuer of a particular investment will not be able to make timely or full payments of principal or income due on that investment. The credit risk arising from cash and equivalents is managed by ensuring that the Fund will only maintain cash balances with reputable licensed financial institutions. For amount due from brokers, the settlement terms are governed by the relevant rules and regulations as prescribed by the Bursa Malaysia Securities Berhad (“Bursa Malaysia”). The settlement terms of the proceeds from the creation of units receivable from the Manager are governed by the SC Malaysia Guidelines on Unit Trust Funds.

Capital risk

The capital of the Fund is represented by equity consisting of unit holders' capital of RM1,543,631 (2020: RM1,461,111) and retained earnings of RM2,405,790 (2020: RM4,238,929). The amount of equity can change significantly on a daily basis as the Fund is subject to daily subscriptions and redemptions at the discretion of unit holders. The Fund's objective when managing capital is to safeguard the Fund's ability to continue as a going concern in order to provide returns for unit holders and benefits for other stakeholders and to maintain a strong capital base to support the development of the investment activities of the Fund.

4. FAIR VALUE ESTIMATION

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date (i.e. an exit price).

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities traded in an active market (such as publicly traded derivatives and trading securities) are based on quoted market prices at the close of trading on the financial year end date.

An active market is a market in which transactions for the assets or liabilities take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market is determined by using valuation techniques. The Fund uses a variety of methods and makes assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each financial year end date. Valuation techniques used for non-standardised financial instruments such as options, currency swaps and other over-the-counter derivatives, include the use of comparable recent transactions, reference to other instruments that are substantially the same, discounted cash flow analysis, option pricing models and other valuation techniques commonly used by market participants making the maximum use of market inputs and relying as little as possible on entity-specific inputs.

The fair values are based on the following methodologies and assumptions:

- (i) For bank balances and deposits with licensed financial institutions with maturities less than 1 year, the carrying value is a reasonable estimate of fair value.
- (ii) The carrying value of receivables and payables are assumed to approximate their fair values due to their short term nature.

4. FAIR VALUE ESTIMATION (CONTINUED)

Fair value hierarchy

The Fund adopted MFRS 13 “Fair Value Measurement” in respect of disclosures about the degree of reliability of fair value measurement. This requires the Fund to classify fair value measurements using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements. The fair value hierarchy has the following levels:

- Level 1: Quoted prices (unadjusted) in active market for identical assets or liabilities
- Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices included within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly (that is, as prices) or indirectly (that is, derived from prices)
- Level 3: Inputs for the asset and liability that are not based on observable market data (that is, unobservable inputs)
